It's Not the Reward, It's How You Use It

Option 1

Option 3
Mother keeps the bars secret at first. Then halfway through the ride, before the children have made any trouble, she hands out the granola bars. She says, "It is so pleasant riding with you this trip."
What did the children learn?
Option 4
Mother keeps the bars secret at first. The children start making trouble again. She stops the car, shows the children the granola bars, and says, "Look what I brought. You could have had them if you had not started this trouble. Now you can't have them."
What did the children learn?
